Depart via scheduled air service to Dublin, Ireland

Day 2 Wednesday, June 13 Dublin (D)

Arrive in Dublin

Meet your MCI Tour Manager, will assist the group to the awaiting motorcoach for a panoramic tour of Dublin's highlights including St. Stephen's Green, Merrion Square, Liffey Footbridges, Grafton Street, Temple Bar, O'Connell Street, Phoenix Park, and entrance to Trinity College, Ireland's oldest university. Trinity College contains the Book of Kells, which dates from AD 800, making it one of the oldest books in the world

Dublin is Ireland's capital and its largest, most cosmopolitan city. It wasn't before the Viking raids of the 9th century that Dublin was fully established. Today, with its elegant Georgian streets, gregarious inhabitants and long history, it's little wonder Dublin is a city of writers

Day 4 Friday, June 15 Dublin (B,D)

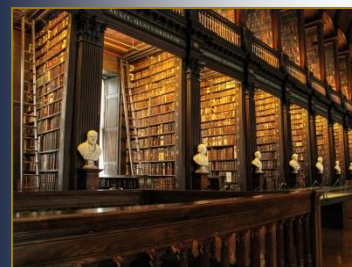
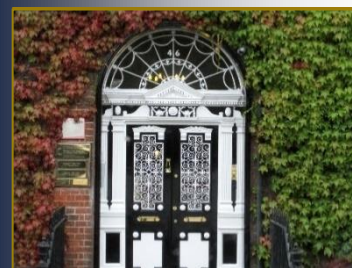

Afternoon at leisure for shopping or to take part in an optional activity offered to each choir

Option 1: Excursion to Glendalough and the Wicklow Mountains. The steep wooded slopes of Glendalough the "valley of the two lakes" harbor one of Ireland's most atmospheric monastic sites — established in the 6th century. Here we see the Round Tower, Cathedral, St. Kevin's Cross, and Gatehouse



Option 2: Travel north to the picturesque maritime village of Malahide for some time in the village or on the beach. Here we will visit the Malahide Castle, one of Ireland's oldest and most historic castles. Return to Dublin via Howth. Howth is a fishing and yachting port, and popular suburban resort on the north side of Howth Head. Howth Head gives fine views of Dublin Bay, the Wicklow Mountains, and Boyne Valley

Option 3: Visit the Guinness Storehouse. Visitors will discover what goes into the making a pint of Guinness - the ingredients, the brewing process, the time, the craft and the passion. Following the tour, enjoy a pint of Guinness. Continue the tour with a visit to the Teeling Whiskey Distillery, Dublin's newest whiskey distillery. Walk through the history of Dublin distilling before taking the tour of the operational distillery. Enjoy the Craft Whiskey Comparison at the ultimate taste test

Option 4: Visit the GAA Museum established to commemorate, recognize and celebrate the GAA's enormous contribution to Irish sporting, cultural and social life. Exhibits share insight into the origins of hurling, Gaelic football and the role played by the GAA in the Irish cultural revival and nationalist movement. Also take a tour of Croke Park Stadium that recreates the experience of the magic of a match day at one of the most historic and modern sporting arenas in the world. Enjoy a skyline tour at Croke Park Stadium. Ascend to a walkway 145 feet above the ground to take in views of the Irish Capital from five different viewing platforms

Option 5: Afternoon cruise out of the city to experience the freedom of the magnificent Dublin Bay. Travel down the River Liffey south to the historic Dalkey Island and arrive at Dun Laoghaire. Time at leisure to take a stroll to Dalkey village with its many historic structures, famous pubs and eateries

Morning guided tour of Dublin Castle. Dublin Castle once functioned as a military fortress, a prison, treasury, courts of law and the seat of English Administration in Ireland for 700 years. Dublin Castle is now used for important state receptions and presidential inaugurations

Day 6 Sunday, June 17 Dublin / Cardiff (B,D)

Transfer via ferry across the Irish Sea. Continue to Cardiff via motorcoach

Cardiff, the capital city of Wales since 1955, is one of Europe's fastest growing cities. It has developed from being a pleasant capital with a fine maritime history into a vibrant state-of-the art city with an exciting future. It is also an ancient city, and the legacy left by the Romans, Normans, and the Industrial Revolution is clearly visible



Day 7 Monday, June 18 Cardiff / Stonehenge / London (B,D)

Breakfast at the hotel

Enjoy a morning tour of Cardiff Castle, which stands in the very center of the city. The castle contains some of the most important historic interiors in Britain and occupies the site where a Roman fort once stood

Also visit the Museum of Welsh Life at St. Fagan's. Here, travel back in time and experience how life in Wales would have been at various stages over time

Transfer to London via Stonehenge, Europe's most famous prehistoric monument constructed over 5,000 years ago!

Evening dinner and overnight

Established 1,250 years ago by King Aethelbald, London became an important Roman city. It was resettled by the Saxons in the fifth century, after the end of the Roman occupation. London has been scourged by the plague (1665) and was almost entirely destroyed by the Great Fire (1666). World War II's "Blitzkrieg" tore up the city considerably. She stands today as a monument to perseverance, culture, excitement, history, and greatness

Day 8 Tuesday, June 19 London (B,D)

Breakfast at the hotel

Morning at leisure for sightseeing, shopping or other activities

Lunch on own

Performance as part of the American Celebration of Music in Britain

Afternoon tour of London includes the residential and shopping districts of Kensington and Knightsbridge. See Westminster Abbey, where most English Kings and Queens have been crowned since 1066, and where many are buried. Also see Whitehall and Trafalgar Square with Nelson's Column, Big Ben and the Houses of Parliament, Buckingham Palace, St. Paul's Cathedral, and the 900-year-old Tower of London

Day 9 Wednesday, June 20 London / Windsor (B,D)

Breakfast at the hotel

Excursion to Windsor for a tour of Windsor Castle, which was built 900 years ago by William the Conqueror to guard the western approach to London. Today, it is England's largest castle and also the largest inhabited stronghold in the world. Highlights of the visit will be St. George's Chapel and, subject to royal commitments, the State Apartments

Return to London for an afternoon at leisure

Evening Farewell Dinner and overnight

Day 10 Thursday, June 21 Depart for home (B)

Transfer to one of London's airports for return flight
