Arrive in Dublin

Meet your MCI Tour Manager, will assist the group to the awaiting motorcoach for a panoramic tour of Dublin's highlights including St. Stephen's Green, Merrion Square, Liffey Footbridges, Grafton Street, Temple Bar, O'Connell Street, Phoenix Park, and entrance to Trinity College, Ireland's oldest university. Trinity College contains the Book of Kells, which dates from AD 800, making it one of the oldest books in the world Late afternoon hotel check-in

Evening Welcome Dinner and overnight

Dublin is Ireland's capital and its largest, most cosmopolitan city. It wasn't before the Viking raids of the 9th century that Dublin was fully established. The 'boom years' came in the 18th century and the city expanded across the river forming a new Dublin of stately squares, streets and Georgian mansions. Today, with its elegant Georgian streets, gregarious inhabitants and long history, it's little wonder Dublin is a city of writers

Afternoon at leisure for shopping or to take part in an optional activity offered to each choir

Option 1: Excursion to Glendalough and the Wicklow Mountains. The steep wooded slopes of Glendalough the "valley of the two lakes" harbor one of Ireland's most atmospheric monastic sites — established in the 6th century. Here we see the Round Tower, Cathedral, St. Kevin's Cross, and Gatehouse













Option 2: Travel north to the picturesque maritime village of Malahide for some time in the village or on the beach. Here we will visit the Malahide Castle, one of Ireland's oldest and most historic castles. Return to Dublin via Howth. Howth is a fishing and yachting port, and popular suburban resort on the north side of Howth Head. Howth Head gives fine views of Dublin Bay, the Wicklow Mountains, and Boyne Valley

Option 3: Visit the Guinness Storehouse. Visitors will discover what goes into the making a pint of Guinness - the ingredients, the brewing process, the time, the craft and the passion. Following the tour, enjoy a pint of Guinness. Continue the tour with a visit to the Teeling Whiskey Distillery, Dublin's newest whiskey distillery. Walk through the history of Dublin distilling before taking the tour of the operational distillery. Enjoy the Craft Whiskey Comparison at the ultimate taste test

Option 4: Visit the GAA Museum established to commemorate, recognize and celebrate the GAA's enormous contribution to Irish sporting, cultural and social life. Exhibits share insight into the origins of hurling, Gaelic football and the role played by the GAA in the Irish cultural revival and nationalist movement. Also take a tour of Croke Park Stadium that recreates the experience of the magic of a match day at one of the most historic and modern sporting arenas in the world. Enjoy a skyline tour at Croke Park Stadium. Ascend to a walkway 145 feet above the ground to take in views of the Irish Capital from five different viewing platforms

Option 5: Afternoon cruise out of the city to experience the freedom of the magnificent Dublin Bay. Travel down the River Liffey south to the historic Dalkey Island and arrive at Dun Laoghaire. Time at leisure to take a stroll to Dalkey village with its many historic structures, famous pubs and eateries

Morning guided tour of Dublin Castle. Dublin Castle once functioned as a military fortress, a prison, treasury, courts of law and the seat of English Administration in Ireland for 700 years. Dublin Castle is now used for important state receptions and presidential inaugurations

### Day 6 Sunday, July 9 Dublin / Galway (B,D)

Breakfast at the hotel

Morning transfer to Galway for a guided tour of this medieval city. Enjoy a visit to Knockmoy Abbey. Picturesquely situated on a small lough, are the ruins of Knockmoy Abbey (National Monument), a Cistercian house founded in 1190. The nave is undecorated but the choir has some fine carving. On the north wall is one of Ireland's few examples of medieval wall painting, dating from about 1400

Galway is picturesquely situated at the northeast end of Galway Bay. With its narrow streets, old stone and wooden shopfronts, good restaurants and bustling pubs, it is one of Europe's fastest growing cities and ranks fourth in size in Ireland, after Dublin, Cork and Limerick

### Day 7 Monday, July 10 Galway / Bunratty / Killarney (B,D)

Breakfast at the hotel

Excursion to the Cliffs of Moher, one of Ireland's most spectacular sights. On a clear day, the views are tremendous

Lunch on own

Transfer to Killarney via Bunratty for a visit to Bunratty Castle, the most complete and authentic medieval fortress in Ireland. Also visit the Folk Park, a living reconstruction of the homes and environment of Ireland of over a century ago

Evening dinner and overnight

Renowned for its beauty, famed for the splendor of its scenery, Killarney is one of the world's best-loved tourist spots. Killarney (Cill Airne - The Church of Sloes) became a magnificent town around 1750 when the local magnate, Lord Kenmare, developed the tourist business and four major roads were built to the outside world

## Day 8 Tuesday, July 11 Killarney (B,D)

Breakfast at the hotel

Today enjoy a tour of the Ring of Kerry Highlights including Molls Gap and Ladies View. Molls' Gap is a spectacular photographic viewing with a magnificent view of Death Valley. Close by is the famous Ladies View viewing point which gives a different perspective of the countryside, with the three Lakes of Killarney all surrounded by the Kerry Mountains Lunch on own

#### Day 9 Wednesday, July 12 Killarney / Blarney / Dublin (B,D)

Breakfast at the hotel

Transfer to Blarney where we will visit the Blarney Castle and Stone. The castle dates from 1446 and is built on solid limestone in beautiful grounds. The sacred stone is found at the top of the castle and when you catch a glimpse of it, you may well feel compelled to bend over backwards and kiss it! Lunch on own
